The theme this year, chosen by President Melissa Witt, is InFusion: Inspiring Minds Want to Grow.



President's Corner Inspiring Minds: It's Time to Grow

Author and holocaust survivor Viktor Frankl observed, "Between stimulus and response there is a space. In that space is our power to choose our response. In our response lies our growth and our freedom." From this quotation I notice two things. First, we as members of the speech education community have come face to face with some concerning stimuli over the last few years. There are obstacles facing us that affect our jobs, our families, and our students. Second, nothing even remotely as impressive as those faced by Viktor Frankl. I do not say this to minimize the real fears, concerns, and realities we are facing. Rather I ask all of us to take time in this space and choose our response. It is time to move from short term, reactive, crisis-driven communication to a long term, proactive strategic communication.

I am going to ask our membership to consider three points of action going forward, with regard to our work ahead: Perspective, Patience, and Professionalism.

PERSPECTIVE

If you've been to convention, if you've been a member, you understand that our membership is comprised of a varied assortment of professionals. We have junior high and high school speech/debate/theatre teachers; we have teachers who specialize in Communication Applications or Professional Communication; we have college professors of Communication Studies, Speech Communication, Mass Communication, Speech Education, and more. We are a diverse group with diverse interests but all with the goal toward providing exceptional education in the field of communication. In addition, we have teachers of English, Social Studies, Journalism. I've even heard that some of our members teach math and science! We have mothers, fathers, sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, significant others, and even grandparents. We have new teachers, veteran teachers, and retired teachers. We have men, women, and diverse ethnicities. We have lifetime educators, attorneys, lobbyists, and state legislators. As your organizational leadership works to address challenges you face at the legislative and state level, we ask you to understand that we are planning and working for ALL of you. More importantly, remember that we ARE you. If you see a problem, an area that we can improve, bring that to our attention. But also bring your ideas, your solutions with thought to how they would affect the membership.

PATIENCE

We have some work to do at the state and local levels. We have some advocacy campaigns to put into motion. It is time to transition from crisis communication to long-term

strategy. Our administration, parents, community leaders, SBOE members, and legislators need to hear about what our students are accomplishing, what our teachers are doing, and what our programs offer the students and the community as part of the norm, not merely whenever we perceive a crisis. This is going to require patience and persistence on the part of each one of us. I can brag about you to anyone, but I cannot tell you what is important in your community and how you help to achieve those goals. You are best situated to make connections with your administration, school board members, and civic leaders to build the network of support that will value your contributions. At the end of the day, that is what is going to protect our programs long after we are gone.

PROFESSIONALISM

We work long hours. We coach anywhere from 7-20 separate events. Many of us do this alone, while teaching English. while raising children, while caring for elderly parents. ,while battling debilitating pain, disease and even In the midst of tragedy. We show up and we show out. We get CDL's so that we can drive our students. We miss holidays and vacations and birthdays. These are all choices that we make. They are not excuses for a lack of professionalism. We teach our students interviewing, judge adaptation, and a host of other skills to help them address others with a professional demeanor. We must hold ourselves to the same standard. This is a most difficult lesson for me in particular. It has taken

me many years to understand that professional isn't limited to the content knowledge I possess and my ability to teach it to my students effectively. It is also the way I present myself to parents and especially administrators. It is my digital profile. It is my presence at school board meetings, staff inservices, etc. It is my willingness to listen first to understand before I criticize, underestimate, or reject the ideas of others. It is true: your attitude, more than your aptitude, will determine your altitude. If your principal doesn't see you as a professional educator, if they can't trust that you will be able to address board members, superintendents, donors., with grace and dignity, you and your program will only last as long as a principal likes you or cares about speech education. I say this as

one of you. I say this as someone who wasn't gifted with these skills but has had to learn not only how to acquire them, but first to appreciate that I need to acquire them. I was gifted with the skills of the debater - I can argue with people and point out inconsistencies with ideas, statements, actions. Believe it or not, some people don't like that! (Who knew?!) I have met consummate professionals in this organization. They hold themselves and their students to a higher standard. I want to thank those of you who lead in this way - you are leading colleagues, not merely students. For those of us who are buried in debate literature, grading deadlines, and lesson plans: look up from your desk and remember an idea paraphrased financial counselor Dave Ramsey, "Do what you have to do, so that you can do what you want to do."

For the first time in several years, I see a way that we can turn around what has been perceived as a very disconcerting trend in education. But like a large ship, it isn't simple and it isn't quick. It will take all of our persistence and steady action. I know what this is asking of you. It's asking you to do more. It's asking you to be more. It's asking the people often doing the most in their building with the least amount of support to take on one more thing. But here's the payoff: investing your time and energy into your community will result in your gaining support, possibly even help, and definitely respect. If we do more now, we will have more later.
