CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT EXERCISE



Character Valentines

In Oral Interpretation and Theatre, creating a well-rounded character is crucial to the success of a performance. In developing a character, performers must take the time to identify relationships both actively occurring in the scene and actively affecting the scene. Define the relationship and define what your character NEEDS from the relationship. Michael Shurtleff outlines 12 Guideposts in his book, Audition. It is no wonder that relationship is the first Guidepost he talks about. It is important to "find the love".

Have students select a character they are playing and a relationship that is important to their character. It should be a relationship that affects their goals - and is standing in the way of what they want to achieve. Students will then create and write a valentine card to this person from the perspective of their character. The valentine should represent the character's innermost desires. What do they wish they could say to this person? What do they wish this person would do for them? What do they wish they could do for this person?

This exercise allows students interactive practice with developing an internal monologue, defining relationships and their impact on achieving their goals, and setting importance to their scene.

SPEED DEBATING CLASSROOM EXERCISE

This is a great activity to help build skills of argumentation, impromptu speaking, creative thinking, and more!

Students will be randomly paired up with another student. Students will be assigned "A" or "B". Those who are B will be rotating throughout the classroom at the end of each timed session.

Students will be given a brief topic to debate and assigned a side. Marvel is better than DC; hotdogs are a sandwich, school should be year-round, and so on. Students will have three minutes to debate one another:

Person A - 1 minute to argue their assigned side.

Person B - 1 minute to argue their assigned side.

Person A and B - 1 minute cross-examination

Person A - 30 second rebuttal

Person B - 30 second rebuttal

Students will then move onto their next "opponent" for a new topic.
